#### **Group Competition**

Now that we can look outside and imagine that spring is just around the corner, it's time to launch our Group Competition for this year. Focusing on all the joy and other benefits of 'Growing Your Own', we would like to see what you can produce from a 1 square metre plot, or up to 9 pots if that's more convenient for your group.

Your 1 square metre might be a specially made raised bed, an area marked off in a larger plot or up to 9 pots whose diameters add up to no more than 1m in each direction..

(Search 'RHS building raised beds' or 'RHS growing veg in pots' for advice.)









You can grow fruit, flowers or veg, or a combination.

The plot should be tended by 4-8 people (eg. friends, club members).

This year, the three age groups are:

8 and under

9 - 14 years

15 and above (including adults!)

Keep a photographic record of the plot from the beginning, and be prepared to present this, along with a basket of produce at the Summer Show on August 15<sup>th</sup>, 2020.

Plots will be judged on the best use of the ground: plants and crops raised; care of the plot/pots; the photographic record and the produce displayed at the show.

Enjoy the experience of growing, with the possibility of winning one of our lovely shields as a bonus.

Notification of entry must be sent to the Show Secretary (CHS\_ShowSec@btinternet.com or by hand to 37, The Street, Capel) by Wednesday 12<sup>th</sup> August 2020, giving the group name and participants' names.

Produce and the photographic record need to be brought to the Show Marquee before 10am on Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> August 2020.

- 63 A decorated hat for a Spring Parade.
- 64 A plate of 5 decorated small cakes (covered in cling film).
- 65 A drawing or painting; "Spring Time", of any size.

Children of 6 to 12 years

- 70 5 decorated Bunny or Easter Egg biscuits (covered in cling film).
- 71 A pop-up Birthday or Easter card, no larger than  $30 \text{cm} \times 21 \text{cm}$ .
- 72 A Spring Garden on a plate (Attridge prize).
- 73 Five home-made paper flowers (many ideas on the internet if needed!).

#### Cookery

Note – jars & lids must not be branded, even with jar manufacturer's name. 1lb

- 40 1 Jar of Marmalade, 400g or more; label with day/month/year of production.
- 41 1 Jar of **Chutney**, 400g or more; label with day/month/year of production.
- 42 1 Jar **Pickled Onions**, 400g or more; label with day/mth/year of production.
- 43 1 Jar of **Honey**, 200g or more; label with day/month/year of production.

All following items to be covered with cling film or similar cover.

Bread to be made the previous day, but not frozen overnight and not made from packet mixes.

- **5 Easter biscuits** to be made using the following recipe: 3oz butter, 3oz sugar, 1 egg yolk, ½oz chopped peel, 1oz currants, ½ tsp mixed spice, 6oz flour, a pinch of salt, a little milk if nec. (Use a fluted cutter).
- 45 A Simnel cake
- 46 A Decorated Victoria sandwich, theme "Spring" (top decorated only).
- 47 5 pieces of Traybake: any base mixture of cake/biscuit/cereal with a topping, baked on a tray, cut into squares or fingers to serve.
- 48 1 Loaf of White or Wholemeal bread, not made in a bread-making machine.
- 49 1 Loaf of White or Wholemeal bread, made in a bread-making machine.
- 50 1 Loaf of Specialist Bread, not made in a bread-making machine (e.g. fruit/olive etc.). (Display with list of ingredients.)
- 51 1 Loaf of **Specialist bread** (e.g. fruit/olive etc.) **made** in a bread-making machine. (Display with list of ingredients.)
- 52 6 eggs condition of shell and contents of the egg will be judged.

#### **Handicrafts**

53 "Over the Winter." An item of handicraft which you produced in those cold, dark days when you couldn't garden, go for walks etc. Must fit/stand within a 40cm x 40cm square.

## Please read all introductory notes and class descriptions carefully.

(For further clarification, RHS and WI Show manuals can be useful.)

# Entries must comply with descriptions to make it fair for all and disqualification can be upsetting.

Please do not be daunted by the 'rules'; entering the Show is fun, but we want it to be equal for all whilst maintaining our high standards. If you are in any doubt, just ask!

Helpful Hints: The RHS Classification of Narcissi Divisions will be used. Measure length of trumpet and petals if you are in doubt of class to enter and refer to RHS Show Handbook and any provided illustrations. Narcissi (Daffodils) may be staged with their leaves; e.g. 3 leaves with 3 flowers. A Vase's height is taller than its width, while a Bowl's width is equal to or wider than its height.

#### **Horticultural Classes**

#### **Cut Flowers**

- 1 A vase of **3 Trumpet narcissi** (Div. 1) of one variety (no miniatures); *length of trumpet as long as or longer than length of petal.*
- 2 A vase of **3 Large cupped narcissi** (Div. 2) of one variety (no miniatures); length of cup more than one third but less than equal to length of petal.
- 3 A vase of **3 Short cupped narcissi** (may be Div. 3 or Div. 9 (e.g. Old Pheasant Eye)) of one variety (no miniatures); *length of cup less than one-third length of petal.*
- 4 A vase of **3 Double narcissi** (single headed only) of one variety.
- 5 A vase of **3 Multi-headed narcissi** of one variety; no dwarfs or miniatures.
- **6 'Any Other'**. A vase of 3 narcissi, of one variety, not included in the above classes eg split corona.
- 7 A vase of 3 Dwarf or Miniature narcissi of one variety, to include narcissi of less than 12" high, may be single or multi-headed.
- 8 A vase or bowl of **9 Narcissi** of two or more varieties (Hall prize).
- 9 A vase of **3 Tulips** of one variety.
- 10 A vase of 5 Tulips of two or more varieties.
- 11 A vase or bowl of Spring flowers (these include Wallflowers, Pansies, Auriculas, etc., but exclude narcissi and tulips; exhibit 10 stems at least, of one or more kinds or varieties; natural foliage allowed).
- 12 A vase or bowl of **Primulas** of 2 or more mixed varieties (no more than 6 stems); *Primulas include primroses and polyanthus*.
- **13 4 Pansy blooms**, including violas, of one or more varieties. Container supplied.
- 14 A vase with 1 Camellia bloom, natural foliage allowed.

- 15 A vase with **3 Camellia blooms** of one or more varieties, natural foliage allowed.
- 16 A vase of 3 flowering Shrub/Tree stems, one or more kinds.

#### **Pot Plants & Vegetables**

- 17 1 Flowering plant in pot (max 7" (178mm) diameter) (corms, e.g. cyclamen; pseudobulbs, e.g. orchids; and rhizomes, e.g. begonias, allowed but **not** bulbs).
- **18 1 Flowering plant** in pot (over 7" (178mm) diameter) (corms, pseudobulbs and rhizomes, allowed but **not** bulbs).
- 19 1 Foliage plant in pot of any size.
- 20 1 Pot of Flowering bulb(s) (max 15" (381mm) diameter) (corms, pseudobulbs and rhizomes not allowed) (Hall prize).
- 21 1 Cactus or Succulent in pot (max 5" (127mm) diameter).
- 22 1 Cactus or Succulent in pot (over 5" (127mm) diameter).
- 23 A pot, trough or bowl of **Alpine plants** of any size.
- **24** A large tray of pricked-out seedlings (approx. 35cm x 23cm) of one kind, labelled with name and date of sowing (Hall prize).
- 25 Best Tomato plant judged on health and vigour; one prize only given.
- 26 3 sticks of Rhubarb with scales removed but the bottom 3" (76mm) of leaf left on.
- 27 3 Leeks.
- 28 3 of any kind of Vegetable.

#### **Decorative – Floral Exhibits**

No artificial flowers to be used.

- 29 "An Easter Celebration", an exhibit not exceeding 60cm width and depth, accessories allowed.
- **30** "A Toast to Spring", a petite exhibit not exceeding 25cm in width, depth or height, presented in a glass, accessories allowed.
